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Top ten tips to save energy

Here are some top tips to help you save energy from National Energy Action:



You can save around £70 just by remembering to turn off electric appliances and not leave many of them on standby e.g. TV, laptops, mobile phones



Save an average of £75 on electricity a year by drying clothes on a clothesline, instead of using a tumble dryer



If you only have a single room thermostat for the whole house, for every degree you increase the temperature, it will increase the heating bill by about 10%.



Taking a four minute shower could save you up to **£65** per year on your household energy bills.



Only boil the water you need in your kettle. This can save you £14 per year.



Effective insulation of your hot water cylinder is important, increasing the insulation 80mm thick, could save you £40 a year.



Only run the dishwasher when full. One less run per week could save £18 per year.



Washing clothes at 30 C and 1 less cycle per week can save around £36 a year on energy



Switch off lights when not in use. This could save your household £30 a year. Switching to LED bulbs could save you up to £13 per bulb per year



Professional draughtproofing of windows, doors and blocking cracks in floors and skirting boards can save around £100 a year.

Social supermarkets

Social supermarkets are set up within a community organisation's premises to offer food, cleaning products and toiletries at discounted prices or via a membership charge.

Some distribute food vouchers rather than operating as a shop. All offer wraparound provision and signpost to services such as benefit checks, debt advice, training and employment advice and childcare. Most operate on a referral basis only.

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Tips to reduce food waste and save money



Houses in the UK throw out 6.5 million tonnes of food every year. An average family of four can save over £60 a month by reducing food waste.

Make the most of leftovers

- Batch cooking cooking larger amounts and keeping portions for later can keep down the cost of food.
- Freeze for later having prepared meals in your freezer is a great way to avoid buying expensive ready meals or takeaways. Simply double up on the quantities and freeze half.
- Lunch box leftovers make the most of leftovers to create additional meals.
 Meats left over from dinner can be added to a healthy salad or tasty sandwich.

Savvy storage - storing food correctly can reduce waste

- Bread should be in a cupboard or bread bin – it goes stale quicker in the fridge
- Check your fridge is set below 5°C to keep your food fresher for longer
- Apart from pineapples, bananas and onions, the best place to store fruit and vegetables is in the fridge

Differences between 'Use by' and 'Best before' dates

- 'Use by' relates to safety. Food can be eaten up until and on the 'use by' date, but not after.
- 'Best before' relates to quality. Food will be safe to eat after this date, but it may not be at its best. Use your judgement to decide.
